### Teaching Law Enforcement

- To deal more effectively with the mentally ill – who make up 10% of the calls officers respond to!
- (Los Angeles Times 1999)

 Persons in crisis who are mentally ill commit more than 1,000 homicides per year

#### WHY?

- Reduce injuries to officers
- Reduce injuries to the mentally ill
- Reduce liability
- Divert mentally ill from jail and get them the help they really need

- + It's the right thing to do!
- (Not just a claim but an evidence based practice Kent State University)

- Proven techniques to de-escalate volatile mentally ill persons

 Wherever CIT is in place the call for SWAT & Negotiators decreases by 60%

# Examples

- 1-day Crisis Intervention Team training:
- Geared to the officer that deals with these types of calls on a daily basis (10% of all dispatched calls)
- Gets into de-escalation, meds, suicide calls, illnesses, mentally ill persons and family members perspective.
- Less-lethal force issues
- And more

### Not Just For Line Officers

 Training can be tailored to be relevant for Dispatchers/Call takers, Probation/Parole officers, EMS and first-line supervisors
